

Another Memorial for God

For many years the cause of God in Bristol has suffered owing to the inadequacy of the hall the churchmembers were compelled to use for their services. Such a cause as ours is worthy of a first-class building, situated in the best part of the city, but in Bristol, as in many other parts of the conference, our brethren and sisters have had to manage as best they could in a hall too small for their needs, badly located and, in many respects, quite unsuitable. They struggled on, however, from year to year, until it became evident to all that the situation could not continue indefinitely, and a start was made, under the leadership of Pastor and Mrs. T. H. Cooper, to raise a fund for the erection of a church building. Pastor and Mrs. D. Morrison who succeeded Brother and Sister Cooper, fostered the plan, giving it their very best support, churchmembers willingly and gladly co-operating. In the spring of 1926, definite

plans were laid give the their church desire.heart's A very fine site was secured, building operations soon commenced, and on Sabbath, March 12th, the building was dedicated.

The first meeting was held on Friday evening, March 11th, and was conducted by the writer, who made a call for consecration on the part of all present.


Following Sabbath-school, the next day, Pastor W. H. Meredith, our British Union Conference president, spoke to a large and appreciative audience, which included members from Bath, and almost the entire Croscombe church. The Lord was with His servant and hearts were greatly stirred as lessons were drawn from the consecration of the temple of Solomon three thousand years ago. At the close of this inspiring address, the congregation rose to their feet as the building was formally dedicated by prayer.

During the afternoon, a baptismal service was conducted by Pastor D. Morrison. Brother Morrison gave a short address touching on the various points of the message, after which he baptized seven dear ones, five from Croscombe, and one each from Bath and Bristol. These seven were later received into church fellowship.

The closing service of the week-end was held on

Sunday evening, March 13th, Pastor W. H. Meredith again being the speaker.

It seems as though the fine weather has set in early. We are glad for this, as it means so much to our colporteurs, who go from door to door with the printed page. We pray that God will bless them abundantly, enabling them to place many books in the homes of the people, and to win precious souls for the Master. WE receive many inquiries from week to week relative to the plans for the North London church building. Building operations have not yet begun,

but we are pushing on the plans for the same as fast as possible. We are indeed grateful to the many friends who have sent their gifts along for this object. believe that the erection of a church on the Holloway Road, North London, such as we have in mind, will prove a real asset to the cause, and will tend in the direction of winning souls for the message. We shall be glad to receive gifts from any of our members who feel able to contribute. Whether the amount is large or small the gift will be welcome.


To save expense we have decided not to send out to our churches and isolated members the usual quarterly report of tithes and offerings. This report appears in this issue, and should be studied carefully by

every member. It will be noticed that there is a decrease in tithe in South England for the three months ended March 31st, amounting to £236. 18s. 3d. This is very disquieting, especially in view of the fact that our small reserve has already been reduced, and further, that the appropriation received from the European Division was much less than we had hoped to receive. Surely the financial situation in the conference is a call from God to faithfulness on the part of every member in the South British Conference.

It will be seen that the offerings in South England show a decrease of £93 as compared with the same period of last year. Wales shows a slight increase in tithe, but is still a long way behind the total of four years ago. The decrease in offerings in the Welsh field is £17. 6s. 8d. We are glad to see an increase in tithe in Ireland of £163. 18s. 2d. and trust it will be maintained throughout the year. The decrease in mission offerings in the Irish field is 9s. 7d.

THERE is one encouraging feature about the report, and that is the increase in membership. South England shows a gain of 153, Wales a gain of three, and Ireland a gain of two. The total gain, therefore, is 158.

WE are still receiving encouraging reports from our evangelists and their associate workers. Let us

continue to pray for them that God will abundantly bless the efforts put forth. As is well known, these workers have been handicapped to a certain extent through a lack of funds. This should not discourage us, however, as we believe the Lord can make the very most of our resources. If only every member were to determine with the help of God to be a soulwinner during this present year, a very large gain in membership would be seen.

Second Report from Brighton and Hove

At the time of writing we have conducted nine successful Sunday services in the Hove Town Hall. We have, of course, been installed in this hall ever since February 1925 and every Sunday since the Word has been faithfully preached, but these nine services have been part of our special and third Campaign. God has blessed us wonderfully both in attendances, interest, and finances.

In common with others we have had to cut down our expenses considerably, hence our advertising matter has been greatly depleted. We are sorry for this, for, as each subject is advertized, so it appeals to the interest of certain people, so that, week by week, new interests and associations are made.

Our staff, Sisters Lenanton and Davies and Brother Freeth, are kept very busy. The number of Bible studies each is giving is increasing week by week. The interest is growing and now the patient, persistent and prayerful work of piloting souls into the church is occupying our immediate and constant attention. Perhaps few outside of those actually engaged in the work of winning men and women to the cause of truth, realize how trying that task is. Many a heartache, many a disappointment, many a tear, and many a prayer enter into the experience of our more successful workers. They need your prayerful sympathy.

On Thursday, March 31st, we booked the Great Hall here to re-consider the Far-East peril and its meaning ("The Clash In China" was our opening In connexion with that subject in February). meeting we made history as far as our British evangelical work is concerned, by using a six-reeled film entitled, "China's Toiling Millions". The weather of the 31st was the worst we have experienced this year. A strong gale, accompanied by incessant and heavy rain was the order the whole day and night. We expected our meeting to be a failure. It wasn't, however. Some four or five hundred came and gave their undivided attention as the Scriptures, appropriate to the subject, were unfolded. While the film was being shown, later, a Church of England minister, the Rev. C. Reeves, asked if he might make a few explanatory statements as he happened to be on the spot in China when parts of the film were To this we readily agreed. Peculiarly enough, it was the first time Mr. Reeves had had the opportunity of seeing the film, although it was made a few years ago. That night we secured nearly an £8 collection.

In these nine weeks we have secured approximately £100 in collections!

There are several further items of interest.

The local press has given some splendid reports

of our lectures; almost every week a half column has appeared in the Monday morning editions.

Some twenty or thirty people from London and district have left their names for literature, among them being the Toast Master of Toc H and Colonel Varley of the Stock Exchange. These names have been sent to the Home Missionary Department so that, if possible, the interest may be cared for.

One evening, after the service, an apparently poor and aged woman came to me, and, after considerable tugging at her well-worn bag, deposited a paper parcel in my hand. She said she believed the Lord was coming soon and, having saved this money, she wanted us to use it in preaching the advent message. The parcel contained £5 in silver. The donor would give no name, neither would she receive any acknowledgement. Truly the Lord is at work.

The following word was sent to me, c/o The Hove Town Hall and is produced to encourage those who are at work proclaiming the message: "Just a note to wish you renewed health and strength. You have been like a sign-post from God illuminating the awful fog and material darkness."

So we are encouraged to press on and do the work of God. Sometimes the work goes very hard but the knowledge that souls are appreciating, responding, and growing up into the truth of God counterbalances the adverse experiences and the depressions that sometimes seems to be as perpetual as those reported daily from 2L.O.

Pray for God's builders in Brighton and Hove.

granted. We have also had to submit a statement of our expenses, in order that the bench of magistrates may see that we are not making a profit on our Sunday meetings.

Many of the men are now wrestling with the problem of how to keep Sabbath, and at the same time keep their jobs. Brother King, who is assisting me in this campaign, is helping these men to the very best of his ability, and we trust that we shall be able to help a large number over this great difficulty.

Our Bible-workers still have their hands full.

We regret that sickness has prevented Miss

Clarke from continuing her work, but we hope that she will soon be able to return to us again.

Those of our brethren who have not visited the Scottish cities can hardly appreciate the difficulties which confront the Bible-workers, when they have so many people to visit, and so many stairs to climb in the tenament houses. If Glasgow were like London, or any other English city, it would not be nearly so hard to work, but so many stairs are very tiring.

We trust that our people will remember the work in Glasgow in their prayers, that God may give an abundant harvest.

A RECENT note from Brother Langford says: "At the present time you will notice that I am in Liberia. I came here three weeks ago, and a week later Brother and Sister Hillig and Brother Flammer, all of Germany, arrived here from their home country to start the work. We have been received very kindly by all the officials we have had to meet, and are hoping to find a good place at which to start our

"I expect to reach Sierra Leone early in April, and to be on my way home before May is out. The work in West Africa is onward, good additions have been made in Nigeria and Gold Coast during 1926."

We were quite interested in a newspaper cutting that came to hand yesterday. It was from the South Wales "Argus", and under the title "Newport Man Honoured". It stated that Mr. R. Jacques of Newport had been installed as the new president of the Newport Boot Trades Association. "He is highly respected, and is a prominent figure in the boot trade," says the writer. "He is an elder of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church, and closes his business from sunset on Friday until sunset on Saturday."

A CARD from Pastor W. E. Read tells us that he has just passed through Palestine, visiting Tiberias, Samaria, Jerusalem, etc., and was then crossing to Es-Salt to meet with our members in Transjordania. "We have had some splendid meetings thus far," he By this time he has doubtless passed on through Egypt into Abyssinia.

Brother E. A. Beavon, working in Kisii, Kenya Colony, sends in the following interesting statistics. which he has culled from a lengthy report on "Crime" published in the "East African Standard" on February 26, 1927:

"Comparing the number of serious offences committed in settled areas in 1925 with the total population of provinces it is found that:

"In Ukamba Province there is one case of crime

to every 280 persons.

"In Kikuyu Province there is one case of crime to every 1,214 persons.

"In Naivasha and Nakuru Districts there is one

case of crime to every 73 persons.

In the Coast Province (including Mombasa) there is one case of crime to every 356 persons.

"IN NYANZA PROVINCE THERE IS ONE CASE OF CRIME

TO EVERY 2,464 PERSONS.

"In Eldoret District there is one case of crime to

every 22 persons.

"In Kitale District there is one case of crime to every 51 persons.

"In Rumuruti District there is one case of crime to every 79 persons."

He further states that "the 'districts' are the. settled areas of Kenya, where the natives come into closest contact with civilization," while 'provinces' are chiefly made up of native reserve where practically the only civilizing influence is that of missions."

The Nyanza province, however, is the only province where Seventh-Day Adventists are at work, and it is interesting to note the tremendous difference in the crime rate here as compared with that of the other provinces. Here, certainly, are the most lawabiding natives in Kenya Colony.

Word has just reached us of the arrival of a new assistant to the Treasury Department of the South British Conference. Congratulations to Brother and Sister Parkin on their new baby girl.
