“THE LONDON ADVENT MISSION”

WE who are connected with the meetings being held in North London at the present time feel that the WORKER family would like to have some news of the work here.

This “London Advent Mission,” is different in many ways from the efforts usually held by our ministers and evangelists in various parts of the field. Those of us who have known the message for some time and have attended the meetings of others who have presented it, look in vain, when entering the hall, for the familiar charts and pictures we know so well. As the meeting progresses, however, these familiar pictures, and others not so familiar, are seen to appear from behind the scenes by means of a device which has not been noticed up to this time. When they are no longer needed they pass out of sight. This gives the speaker scope to produce more pictures and charts to illustrate his points. Some of the great “Beast Prophecies” are depicted by means of sets cut out of plywood. Horns are uprooted or grow in most realistic fashion as the scripture is read describing the process.

Then there is the choir of nearly 130 voices, which gives selections and leads community singing every week. Some hymns which are entirely new to England are rendered at these services, and the audience joins in enthusiastically.

After a beautiful recital on the Wurlitzer organ, the curtain moves back to reveal the choir seated in readiness. The ladies, dressed in white, sit in the centre, with the gentlemen, dressed in black, symmetrically seated on either side. This creates a good impression, and illuminated by the hundreds of stage lights, makes a never-to-be-forgotten picture. The singing, we are told, is very much appreciated. While we are by no means a professional choir, yet with the desire to be connected with this work, we have consecrated our voices, and believe that a performance is given which possesses a depth of feeling and stirs many souls.

Brother Anderson leads the choir himself, and under his guidance everyone feels that to be in the choir is to be part of the Lord’s great work for London. An invitation has been extended to members of the audience to join the choir, and about a dozen have responded. We feel that most of these, if not all, will embrace the message more fully as a result of singing God’s Word.

A mid-week Bible class has been started, at which Brother Anderson is taking a verse-by-verse study of the book of Revelation. Fifty or more strangers attend these classes, and have asked for more studies. They want two classes a week.

On the third Sunday

of these meetings a special service of prayer and consecration was held at the close of the ordinary service and about 300 people stayed. Calls were made for those who had never surrendered their lives to Christ to do so that night. A score or more put up their hands in answer to this invitation, and a number are now having studies. A similar number responded to an appeal for those who had strayed from their Saviour to make a reconsecration. During the season of prayer, dozens of voices which were strange to us were heard praising God for this revival and petitioning that the Lord would bless this great preacher and help him to stir London.

Advertisements have been appearing in the local papers, of course, and one paper has given special space in the middle of its pictorial page for the an-

nouncements. In addition to this they have published two-column reports of our meetings each week, illustrated with our own pictures. Even the printers of this paper are gripped with the truth-laden message of the articles they set up.

Every Sunday evening so far has been exceptionally bright and warm, but, in spite of this, good crowds have been attending, and we feel that when the autumn evenings make the out-of-doors less attractive, a still greater work will be done.

Those who are connected with the mission are confident that the Lord will do a mighty work through Brother Anderson. Everyone feels that he is fully consecrated to the work and has a great burden for London. It is a great joy to be connected with him in however small a capacity.

Annual Report

It is with pleasure that we review the advance of the work of the Lord in the South England Conference for the year 1929. Our hearts go out in gratitude and thankfulness to the Giver of every good and perfect gift for His loving watchcare extended over our workers and churches. He has enabled us to raise in this field a sum in tithes and offerings of £20,756 17s. 8d.—this is a gain in title of £452, and £470 in offerings over the year 1928. Our faithful secretary and treasurer, H. D. Clarke, and our much appreciated secretary of departments, Brother F. W. Goodall, will give you further details of these gains.

Some £8,500 was passed over to the Union Conference and Northern European Division for work in their respective fields. Through the use of the remaining £12,000 we were able to carry on a strong work in the departmental and evangelistic work of the conference and in pastoring the flock. As a result of this work we show a net gain in the conference membership of 110. The membership on December 31st stood at 2,189. These faithful believers are scattered from Norfolk to Cornwall in thirty-four churches and companies—some 300 being isolated members.

We much appreciate the faithfulness of our workers and lay-members who have made these results possible. We are grateful, but not satisfied. Under the blessing of heaven the day is not

far distant when these gains per year will be multiplied. We have a loyal and united band of workers. Our churches, with few exceptions, are working harmoniously. Let us look to God for

the fulfilment of the promise of the latter rain, whereby our Gideon band may accomplish the task of warning the seventeen millions in this field of the soon-coming Saviour.

New work has been carried on in Norwich, High Wycombe, Southall, Maidstone, and Weston-super-Mare. We have had the pleasure at this conference of welcoming a new church into the sisterhood of churches from Norwich. This is the first for about eight years from a new centre. Plans are being laid to enter other cities in the near future.

Our Bible-worker force has been depleted. During the past year three were married, and with their partners in life are a strength to the cause. Others were laid aside by illness. We have been pleased to receive from Australia an addition to our evangelistic force, Pastor R. Allen Anderson, who is conducting a strong effort in this northern section of London. We appreciate the help from the General Conference toward this expense.

Our book work has prospered under the able leadership of Brother B. Belton, who will render a report of what has been accomplished by the faithful force of colporteurs. We and they much appreciate the efficient labours of Brother Belton.

We are pleased to inform you that the Good Health work is making progress, and though only an infant at the time of our last annual meeting, has grown to be a sturdy youngster. It is planned to take time during this present session to give further consideration to this good work.

Our membership at the end of June was 2,224—a net gain of thirty-five for the first six months of this year. We show the splendid gain of £578 in tithe and £207 in offerings—£45 of this increase was brought in by Big Week.

Our future is bright. We are able to go up and possess the land. We trust that, through the power of the Holy Spirit, we shall triumph in our individual Christian experience and in the finishing of God's work in the earth, that Jesus may soon come to take us home. O. M. DORLAND.



Sabbath-School Rally at West London

ON Sabbath morning, June 21st, it was our privilege to visit the West London Sabbath-school. As we entered the building we were greeted with special mottoes and charts which impressed us with the fact that the officers of this Sabbath-school were fully alive to the possibilities of a good rally. The carefully arranged programme had been printed in the form of book-marks and given out to the members and friends.

It was most inspiring to see present on time thirty-four children, most of whom had come in from the church school, together with their teachers. Quite a number of parents were also present and a good number of churchmembers.

After the opening exercises we formed into one class with Brother Wilson, the local superintendent, as teacher. There was a good response to his questions. Then for half an hour we listened to the children. Their first song was one of praise, following which one of the older girls recited all the texts for the quarter. A solo by one of the little boys, "God sends the Flowerettes," was very nicely rendered, and an impressive dialogue was given by five of the older girls. Other recitations and solos followed, and a very interesting acrostic, representing Africa, was given by six of the children. A hymn, especially written by one of the teachers, also helped to strengthen the appeal on behalf of Africa. A little boy recited a poem entitled "A Black Boy's Needs," and the closing item given by all the children was, "Wake up Christian Soldiers."

Attention was directed to the various Sabbath-school devices, the children's chart with flowers, each flower representing a certain sum, the adult's chart with buckets and a well, one bucket having to be filled each Sabbath. The superintendent made a special appeal for a good thirteenth Sabbath offering. This was taken up by four of the

children and proved to be a record one, the total amounting to £10 4s. 9d.

Continuing our programme Miss Essery rendered a beautiful solo and Pastor Bevan spoke upon, "How to get the best out of our lesson." Brother Rodgers sang, "I Gave My Life for Thee," and then followed a talk by the conference Sabbath-school secretary on, "The teacher who helps me most." Opportunity was given for discussion, and a most interesting and profitable rally was brought to a close by a nicely rendered duet entitled "Alone" sung by Miss Essery and Mr. Rodgers.

The expressions of appreciation from all present evidenced that this programme, which had been so well arranged by the superintendent, Brother Wilson, and the church-school teachers, Miss D. Lewis and Miss R. Essery, was a great success.
