



# Big Week Campaign

*This Year's Opportunity*

For several years we have had two important financial campaigns in connection with our work—the Harvest Ingathering effort which has taken from six to twelve weeks, and the Big Week activities which last for just seven days in the early part of the year.

The Missions Extension programme, of which the Big Week is a part, has proved to be a real blessing to many mission fields and also to a number of centres in the homeland. Since the plan was put into operation a little over twelve years ago, quite a number of small publishing houses have been established and a number of needy training schools in mission lands, as well as clinics and dispensaries, have been started. These facilities have meant much to our missionaries and others as they have sought to carry the triumphs of the Gospel message in their respective fields.

There are at least seven interests in our own Division which are to benefit particularly from our efforts this year. Three of these are medical items. One is a dispensary in Bergender in Northern Abyssinia; another is a dispensary in the northern part of the Cameroons, West Africa; and the third is equipment for the new hospital in Abyssinia which recently came to us by gift from the emperor of that country.

Then there are two publishing items, one being literature in two of our mission languages, the Twi on the Gold Coast, and the Laplandic, for the inhabitants of the far north of Europe. The other is a home for our colporteur leader in Nigeria. Whenever we send a worker to the mission field we must always plan on furnishing him with a small bungalow, so the request for this item comes within the scope of our Big Week plans for this year.

Then there are two educational items, one being the provision of a small school in Sierra Leone. This is to be in the up-country section of that field and will be a centre where quite a number of African boys and girls will be gathered together for religious instruction. The other is a very needy item, one to which a good deal of thought has been given during recent years, and that is a girls' school for Nigeria. In all the years that we have been carrying forward our work in West Africa we have had no school for girls. This has meant a great loss to our work. Our young teachers have been obliged to take heathen wives in many cases, and if perchance they find them from among our Christian families, they are as a rule quite illiterate. This has been a great handicap to our work, and in order to strengthen the work and make it what it ought to be, it has been felt that we should have a good, strong, well-equipped girls' school.

Special literature has been prepared for the campaign this year, and we are hopeful that all our believers will respond heartily to the call that is being made and plan, during the special week set

aside for the purpose, to sell all the literature they possibly can. They will bring benefit in so many ways. It will benefit the people to whom the literature is sold. It will mean increased business for our publishing house, and incidentally more work for the employees in our printing establishment. Still further, as we enter into service for others and seek by our own efforts to bring joy to them, the Lord will flood our own hearts with His heavenly blessing. Then again, the proceeds from the sales of the literature will bring untold gladness to those who are carrying the heavy burdens in the mission fields when they realize that the

wherewithal is provided so that these dire needs can be met.

Last year our receipts from the Big Week were relatively small, the figure being £367. The year before it was £602, and the year before that £666. What will it be for this year? Doubtless the Union session coming at the time it did and so many changes being made in the field were responsible for the sum being smaller than in previous years. However, we must make every effort this year to reach the goal which has been set, namely, £680. There should be no difficulty in accomplishing this. If every member would bring in either by the sales of literature or as a gift the sum of 3/-, we should more than reach the goal.

We appreciate very much indeed the loyal and self-sacrificing efforts of our churchmembers in all the campaigns of the past, but we are very desirous that this year we enter again whole-heartedly into the plan of raising sufficient to make it possible for all these special needs in the mission fields to be met.

May the Lord bless His people abundantly at this time and go before them in a special way as they seek to co-operate with Him in finishing the work in this generation!

### Notes from the Union President

FROM communications which have reached the office during the past week or two we have been very much encouraged to learn that so many of the evangelistic efforts being held at this time are being well attended. Brother F. W. Johnston from Edinburgh reports between 500 and 600, and Brother G. Hyde, from Manchester, fully 800 people attending the Sunday evening meetings. Good reports are coming from other parts of the field as well. Let us pray that God may bless the efforts that are being put forth and that many souls may be won to a saving knowledge of the truth of God.

IN the development of our work in the British Union during the years, it was deemed advisable to form various legal associations. At the present time we have one which is the holding corporation for all our properties, another which cares for our publishing interests, another which embraces the activities of our health food factory, and still another which operates the Sanitarium and our medical interests generally. As study has been given to this during recent months, it has seemed to the brethren that the time has come when we should consider merging all these interests into one legal association. This plan could include our training school at Newbold, and so all our various activities would become departments of the one legal body.

With a view to working towards this objective, preliminary steps were taken at the time of the annual meetings of the legal associations some weeks ago. The British Union Conference Committee was in session at the same time, and an action was taken with reference to changing the name of the Seventh-Day Adventist Union Limited, which is the legal

association holding all our properties in the British Isles, to British Advent Missions Limited. After this had been adopted by special resolution, we entered into negotiations with the authorities; and word has just come to hand that the certificate acknowledging our new name has been issued. Consequently from now on we shall be known not as the Seventh-Day Adventist Union Limited but as BRITISH ADVENT MISSIONS LIMITED.

The question of gathering all our interests into one legal association will naturally take some time. We shall move along as carefully and yet as quickly as we can in bringing this about. But there is a regular procedure to be followed, and it may take even two years before we have the plan fully worked out.

At the end of the quarter arrangements should be made for all the evangelistic boxes to be brought in to the church treasurers. The first quarter has naturally been a rather short period, due to the fact that the boxes were not ready for distribution until the middle of February. But it has been thought wise to work to the regular quarterly plan, and include in our statistical report for the first quarter whatever proceeds there may be from the evangelistic boxes for the first three months of this year. We believe that there will be a good response on the part of our churchmembers throughout the field. It means so much to build up the work strongly in our large cities. We are hoping and praying that there will be a flow of means to the treasury which will enable our evangelists to advance into the unentered cities of our land.

### Annual Report of the Factory, China Training Institute, 1932

[The following is a synopsis of the report rendered at the Constituency Meeting, December, 1932, by R. A. Brett, who left The Stanborough Press Ltd. in 1929 to take up work in the China Division as Superintendent of Industries.]

DURING the year 1932 God has abundantly blessed us. We know that you will feel happy as you listen to this report and join us in praise and gratitude to our God for His help and protection.

The year had barely commenced when there came the Shanghai incident. What were we to do? Eighty boys and girls on our hands—work must be found or they would have to go home. The brethren met together and felt impressed to send one of our number up river to seek orders. The Lord led in a marvellous way and orders to the value of eight thousand dollars were placed with us. These orders we were able to complete and dispatch, keeping the wheels turning to the end of the school year.

The treasurer's report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1932, shows that the net sales of furniture, etc., were \$81,600.89, an increase of \$36,148.30 over the previous year. The net profit, though slight, was nevertheless an encouragement to our Board.

Our pay roll contains ninety-eight names, including nine regular group leaders and workers; eighty-six students, sixteen of whom are girls, and three

coolies. It has been a pleasure to watch these young people applying themselves to such unaccustomed labour. Very many of them quickly learn and adapt themselves. Not only are they working their way through school; they are learning how to handle tools and make things, using methods which will prove useful in after life. For the past twelve months \$8,262.30 has been paid in wages, representing just about 103,300 hours of labour. The last three months of the year have been rather slack and we have been hard put to it to find work for all the students. We ask for your prayers that work may be found for all.

The following is a list of articles completed and delivered during the year:

300 Tubular Beds; 1,337 Angle Iron Beds; 166 Fowler Type Hospital Beds; 3,437 Desks, Chairs, Benches, Stools, etc.; 44 Tables; 50 Shelving Units and Lockers, and hundreds of smaller articles.

Inquiries recently were made from a medical specialist in Shanghai as to what should be correct postures of students while studying, shapes of seats and backs, slants and heights of tables, backs and seats. Based on the information thus secured we were able to evolve and place on the market a new type of adjustable classroom desk and chair known to our customers as the "Universal Type Classroom Desk and Chair." This is finding favour with some of the leading school-men in Shanghai and elsewhere.

We can report wheeled stretchers, medicine cabinets, spinal fracture beds, and sanitary cans among our new ventures.

The Lord watched over and cared for us all through the year. Though our machinery is of a dangerous type, not one accident has taken place. Not one student who needed work was unable to find it. Some of the tasks undertaken seemed impossible, yet we were divinely guided. Not one of the 2,100 chairs upholstered by girls was complained of. All the machines ran smoothly and well, there being no serious breakages to repair. While other factories were closed owing to war or failing through serious depression, the Lord led customers to our doorstep. At the beginning of December, without any introduction whatever, the president of the Honan University, Kaifeng, visited this Institute. A large auditorium is being completed in his university and needs seats. He had seen some of our products in Wuhan and Yangchow, so paid us a visit. Feeling that the metal auditorium chair was suitable he asked if upon receipt of plans we would draw up a seating plan. This we did, finding that just over 2,880 people could be seated. Two weeks ago Brother Landis was able to visit Kaifeng, and the contract, amounting to \$16,844.00, was signed. Thus the beginning of the year 1933 will see us at work on the second largest order ever received by us. If time permitted we could tell you much more of the Lord's helping hand.

Pray for us, brethren, that the Lord may continue to bless us, to keep us humble, willing servants of His in this sphere, and as true as the steel we fashion. Pray for those earnest boys and girls upon whom our message in this land is soon to

depend, that they may develop into reliable and self-supporting workers; and that the lives we lead as we teach them may be those of overcomers, never losing sight, as we progress, of the purpose God has in mind for this institution.





### Splendid Colporteurs' Institute—and the New Book

A COLPORTEURS' Institute for real inspiration!—for fervent expressions of faith, for warmth and fellowship, for earnest prayer to be endued with greater power, for consecration, genuine and deep.

And yet this is what we should expect!

The men and women who came together in council have been entering into the experience of such scriptures as these: "Go ye, . . . and preach the Gospel to every creature." Mark 16:15. "Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves: be ye therefore wise as serpents, and harmless as doves." Matt. 10:16. "If ye were of the world, the world would love his own: but because ye are not of the world, but I have chosen you out of the world, therefore the world hateth you." John 15:19. "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." Psa. 126:5, 6.

Thus it has been their privilege to tread closely in the Master's footsteps, and, coming together, they have much to give, and at the same time are deeply conscious of their need for more wisdom and efficiency.

Our recent Institute at Stanborough Park bore this out to the full.

Forty colporteurs assembled, many of them recruits from the special campaign held earlier in the year, and the blessing of God attended from the very beginning.

The instruction given by Pastor J. J. Strahle was greatly prized, and, undoubtedly the morning devotional exercises led by Pastors C. V. Anderson and H. W. Lowe were largely responsible for the success of the sessions which followed.

Someone may ask, What form does a Colporteurs' Institute take? Here is a typical day's programme:

9.00-10.00 a.m.	Devotional Service
10.15-11.30 a.m.	Gospel Salesmanship
11.35-12.45 p.m.	Class Work and Drill
1.00 p.m.	Luncheon
2.15-3.15 p.m.	Address
3.30-5.30 p.m.	Class Work and Drill
6.00 p.m.	Tea
7.30-9.00 p.m.	Class Work and Drill

The peak points are the class work and the demonstrations. The older and more experienced workers are usually as keen as the recruits in these exercises. Believing the proverb, "Repetition is the mother of memory," the colporteurs recite the canvass over and over again.

Making a proper "approach" before the actual demonstration of the prospectus is emphasized as a most important factor in Gospel salesmanship.

Then the "demonstration" itself, the "close and departure," and "delivery" are separate studies. Drilling on these phases is necessary and each colporteur is expected to pass through these practical tests. It is really exciting when, towards the close of the Institute, a door is placed in the centre of the room, and one by one the colporteurs come

forward and ring the bell, pass through, and then demonstrate their book in the approved manner.

Many of the colporteurs were in training to handle the new book, *This Mighty Hour*. The grave solemnity of the times was brought forcibly home to us when, even as the colporteurs were reciting the words, "There can be no doubt that we are living on the eve of great events in the East," there commenced the fearful clash between the two avowed enemies of the Orient, China and Japan.

Turning to chapter five of the first section of the book, those who were seeking to make themselves proficient to sell this timely volume read the opening sentence, "Despite all efforts for the preservation of peace there is a growing fear that war will come again." The words are ringing in our ears still!

How tragically true this statement is, for even as we write, before us in the editorial column of our morning paper are the startling statements, "Germany is aflame with a militant nationalism. Jugoslavia stands with poised knife waiting for the onslaught of Italy. The Poles are watching the boiling cauldron of the Corridor; and France looks over Europe with the impulse of terror to strike. It is a terrible picture."

These momentous reminders of the great need for this latest publication are coming just as our colporteurs have dispersed to put into actual experience the principles learned during the precious days spent in council.

Thus, as the hearts of men are being stirred, our trained men and women colporteur-evangelists leave the shelter of our head-quarters church to carry the glad tidings of peace to troubled souls on every hand.


