



Spiritualizing our Methods in the Harvest Ingathering Campaign

WHILE we are endeavouring to help those in less fortunate parts of the world, the Harvest Ingathering affords an opportunity to speak a word in season to every heart whom we meet. There is many a sad heart beneath an outward expression of joy and courage. Could we look within the veil of human lives we would be astonished and almost overcome by the sad, aching hearts thus revealed. To these we are offered an opportunity to minister while we speak to them of the needs of others. The securing of money is only one phase of the Harvest Ingathering Campaign. By taking a spiritual interest in others, a blessing comes to our own hearts.

One of the greatest drawbacks in the Ingathering work is the timidity shown by some of the churchmembers who solicit funds. The churchmember who apologizes when soliciting money for the kingdom of God is not helping the work. Such an attitude will often cause the one approached to want to keep what money he has. On the other hand, the churchmember who speaks with confidence and in clear, forceful tones of the need and of a man's responsibility toward it, will stimulate liberality on the part of the person visited.

THE PREPARED MESSENGER

A churchmember who goes out to visit people in the Ingathering Campaign must be a prepared messenger. Ingathering workers have been repulsed because they were not really ready for the work they had been called to do. God desires that His messengers be fully prepared spiritually and have such a thorough knowledge of

the contents of the paper that they may be able to speak with confidence and complete freedom. The churchmember who goes out to do this kind of work must be prepared by a life of prayer. No man can go to his task unless his very life is immersed in prayer. If he fail in this, his message must of necessity have a false note. It will not have the true ring. He must go consumed with a passion that knows no denial. The man who is prepared with a passion like this can accomplish what otherwise would seem to be superhuman.

He must go with a great sympathy toward the man he approaches. The messenger must go with a knowledge of his task. He must impress the people as being efficient and expert in what he is doing. His information must be definite and no matter what unexpected questions are put to him he must have such a knowledge of his task that nothing can surprise him and the merest detail can be answered at once. When he goes he must talk a direct language, but it must be God's language. It must have dignity and power in it.

One of the greatest mistakes made in soliciting is to approach people in a joking manner. A certain churchmember once visited a business office and approached the man with the following words: "I have come to pull your leg." The man whom he visited had been praying that God might send a messenger to inform him what he could do to advance the kingdom of God. But this approach caused him to become so chilled that he made a negative reply to the request for help.

ing high pressure methods and when it comes to the kingdom of God this same high pressure method must be carefully avoided. In dealing with individuals there must be the greatest gentleness. The gentleness of Christ must fill the heart of the messenger. Rudeness or gruffness should call out even more gentleness and sympathy. When a messenger leaves a man's office, he should leave an impression for good that he will be welcomed should he return again.

THE POWER OF PRAYER

Those who are seeking gifts through the Ingathering work must recognize one power, the power of prayer. Failure in most cases can be marked either to the lack of prayer or by the lack of faith in prayer. From the hour that Christ said on the mountain side, "Ask, and it shall be given you," there has been the necessity for the church to believe this. Not only is a belief in prayer necessary, but there must be a vital practice of prayer. The church long ago formally accepted all of the principles of prayer in their relation to comfort and sorrow. It should also fully accept prayer in its vital relation to its gigantic enterprises. The Harvest Ingathering Campaign must have all of the careful planning, all of the sagacity, all of the looking forward, that business enterprises have. In addition to these it must have power back of it and that power can come alone through prayer. The practice of prayer is an absolute requisite for the securing of gifts. Prayer must not only permeate the individual messenger, but the whole church must be in earnest prayer for its messengers that they may succeed in their task for Him.

OBSTACLES TO GIVING

Men are usually most interested in their own affairs. People of the world are often extremely interested in accumulating wealth. It has been said that their heart and blood are wrapped up in their money. It requires a strong motive to cause men to part with some of their money. The excuses that men may give are many. Often these excuses are plausible. Sometimes they are excuses that appeal to his reason.

A reason frequently given is that so many calls come. This is one of the most difficult objections to answer and one most frequently made. The man who makes the excuse like this must be shown that the present case is a paramount one and that it is a greater opportunity to invest for God than in any other.

Excuses many times seem insurmountable, but over against them is the power of Christ working in the heart. I once had a business man say to me: "I am sorry you have come; yet at the same time I am glad. I felt as though I did not want to give, but my conscience says that I must. I am going to give you a gift now and if you will come three months later I will increase this amount." And he did. No argument of mine could have brought about this decision. It was the prepared conscience alone that could work in this way on this man's heart.

The Ingathering solicitor should be concerned not

only with the large givers, but he should seek also those of moderate and those of lesser income. All need a knowledge of the message, and should be given the opportunity to contribute to the cause of God. Soliciting should never become mechanical, nor should any pressure be exerted, but rather the love of Christ should be manifest in every effort put forth by the solicitor. There should be a great burden in the heart of God's messenger for those whom he contacts. With such a passion in his heart, he will be driven to his knees before he goes out to meet the people. God will help the Harvest Ingathering solicitor to make just the right impression on the hearts of those whom he meets. Many will not only give of their means, but through reading the Ingathering magazine will find the true way as it is in Christ. Truly the only way in caring for the world's needs in this crisis hour is as in ancient days, "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts."

WE have been greatly cheered by the good reports which are coming into the office from all parts of the Union concerning the progress which is being made in the Harvest Ingathering Campaign. We learned recently of several churches who have already got their goal, and of others who are well on the way. There is a reasonable spirit of co-operation and, in many parts, great enthusiasm in this special phase of missionary activity. Let us all press in, for there is no doubt that, with such a willing people, the task can be quickly finished.

IN the course of some weeks, we hope to furnish all our churches with special "Order of Service" forms, made up in small pads. These will be supplied from the local conference offices, and will be of great help in arranging the regular programme of meetings, and particularly the meetings on the Sabbath. We feel that these forms will meet a long-felt need, and enable us to work to a greater measure of uniformity in the conduct of our Sabbath meetings.

PASTOR H. W. LOWE will be with us in the Union for the most of August and will be giving most of his time to the Ingathering work. He will be spending several days in the North England Conference and will be visiting quite a number of our churches.

WE are very glad that the blessing of the Lord has been so manifested in our conferences and institutions during the first half of the year. Quite a number of baptisms are reported from all parts of

the field, and there is a good net gain for the first two quarters of the year. We feel glad also that all the institutions have come out with good financial gains, and the same is true of our conferences and mission fields. In the case of the field work, this is due largely to the splendid increase in tithes, and we feel very grateful to the Lord for these evidences of His prospering hand.

For some time we have been giving a good deal of study to strengthening our educational work. Several of our teachers have been doing special work and we are very glad for the good success which has attended their efforts. As part of this programme we are arranging for some of our teachers to get further experience in other countries. Brother Raitt is spending a brief period this summer in France and Switzerland; and recently, an arrangement was made with the Pacific Union College for Professor Baird to spend the next school year with them. We shall greatly miss Brother Baird from the College at Newbold, and it will mean quite a little adjustment in the regular working plan to release him for nine or ten months. The Pacific Union College, however, is co-operating with us in a very helpful way and we feel very glad for this opportunity for Professor Baird to head up this History Department and to make intimate contacts with our educators and their plan of work on the other side of the Atlantic.

Brother Baird will be sailing toward the close of August so as to be present at the opening of the Pacific Union College early in September. Shall we not remember him in our prayers, that journeying mercies may be his, and that his experiences over there may be helpful and beneficial to him and also to the British Union on his return.

In order to bring help to the College, in view of this arrangement, The Stanborough Press has very kindly arranged for Brother W. L. Emmerson to give some time to special work at Newbold. Brother Emmerson will conduct several classes including Ancient History, History of the Bible, and Christian Evidences, incorporating the results of recent archæological discoveries. Brother Emmerson has been giving special study to these subjects during recent years, and we feel that he will be able to make a valuable contribution to the college work along these lines this year.

LET us remember that the new school year opens on Wednesday, August 21st. Our young people will, ere long, be making their way to Newbold. Some, perhaps, are hesitating. We hope that they will decide quickly and join the ranks of those who are seeking a preparation for the work of God. As fathers and mothers, as relatives and friends, let us remember our young people as they seek to fit themselves for a place in the Master's vineyard.

A VERY encouraging letter came to hand

some weeks ago from Pastor W. McClements, the superintendent of the Nigerian Union Mission. He writes:

"Recently we have had quite a number of new openings in villages around Ibadan. In fact, we have never had so many in Yoruba country at one time as we have just now. The problem is to know how to care for all the interests. . . . One village has sent one priest about his business and invited us to come and help them. We are doing so, and the people are responding in a most encouraging way.

"Brother Edmonds, as usual, is pressed from all sides with appeals for teachers and evangelists, and the work is moving along with increasing power in Ibo country."


Four hundred enthusiastic workers in the literature ministry—nearly a seventh of our entire world colporteur force—assembled for the purpose of holding an all-German Institute.

Immediately following this service of welcome we had reluctantly to say good-bye and prepare for our journey homeward.

British Health and Nursing Association

Report of Semi-Annual Meeting Held in
The Stanboroughs, Wednesday, May 22nd

AFTER the opening hymn and prayer the chairman, Dr. C. E. Nelson, welcomed the members and friends of the Association, and introduced Pastor A. W. Cormack, who represented the General Conference. During the course of his remarks Pastor Cormack emphasized the close relationship between the nursing profession and religion, illustrating his talk with incidents which he had met with in the mission fields. He spoke of the wonderful privilege of being associated with this work. His closing remarks were full of courage, and he impressed upon all present the importance of depending on the help which comes from the One who went about doing good and bore the infirmities and healed the sicknesses of the people.

Dr. Madgwick then spoke of his work in the Kendu Mission Hospital, Kenya Colony. He mentioned the experimental work which they had been carrying on in connection with dietetics and the treatment of ulcers and other diseases peculiar to the tropics.

Departmental Report for 1934 (Concluded)

MISSIONARY VOLUNTEER DEPARTMENT

At the end of the year we reported twenty-nine societies of which twenty were senior, and nine junior. Some of the senior societies, however, have a sprinkling of juniors. The total membership was 556. During the year seventeen young people were baptized. The highest number reporting at any one time during the year was 278. These accounted for the following items :

Bible readings	615
Missionary visits	2,361
Persons taken to services	342
Persons given needed help	2,023
Simple treatments given	401
Articles of clothing given	171
Items of literature distributed	33,978

In addition to this large amount of effort made in the eternal interests of the people, our young folk may be commended for the help they afforded the evangelists by distributing for them 44,149 handbills, advertising their public meetings.

It is worthy of special note that last year the young people in this field made a present of £718. 3s. 10d. to the cause, for its world-wide missionary enterprise, produced by their valiant services in connection with the Harvest Ingathering Campaign. This represented as much as twenty-two per cent of the total of the conference. Our thanks are also due to them for the contribution of £37. 6s. 2d. in offerings to missions, made at their weekly meetings. The further sum of £15. 18s. 2d. was contributed for local enterprises such as Sunshine Bands, the provision of Reading Course books, etc. Ten full sets of Reading Course books were purchased by the respective societies, for which 230 members enrolled. Thirteen juniors completed the Progressive Course A.

A successful ten days' Summer Camp was held at Penrhyn Bay, North Wales, attended by some seventy or eighty young people. This meant much to the work of strengthening the Missionary Volunteer movement in this field.

A special effort is being made this year to revive the study of Bible doctrines by the young people, and there has been a most encouraging enrolment for the Bible Study and Service League. Already some good results are showing from the test applied for the first course.

Early Fruits in Liverpool

ON Sabbath, July 27th, our hearts were made glad as we witnessed the firstfruits of the effort which commenced six months ago, in this great cosmopolitan city. The service was conducted by Brother Maudsley, there being a good attendance of both churchmembers and interested followers.

Though the baptism had originally been planned for the end of October, it was decided, owing to the writer having to return to Ireland, to hold it at this juncture. Plans have, however, been made for another baptism, possibly in September.
