"Harvest Home" is always a happy celebration, but when the harvest is a band of joyful souls thrilled with the glory of truth and gladly surrendered to the Master of the harvest, the reaper's joy is full

How easily we forget the difficulties and problems that from time to time threatened to spoil the precious grain. True to type, we always had one eye on the weather and oh, those awful Sundays when after a glorious opening and a thrilling series of meetings, with interest mounting every week and names piling up. the winter showed its teeth in ugly fashion! How our teeth chattered as we sat among a slowly freezing audience, wondering that so many had dared to risk pneumonia in that icy theatre. Almost desperately we prayed for heating inside or outside and how graciously our need was provided in the nick of At one time spirits of devils tried to wreck one all too intense meeting. From every direction, soon after the sermon had been introduced, spiritualist mediums and their supporters jumped to their feet and began to hurl denunciations at the platform. We extend a hearty welcome to Wales to Brother and Sister L. Wood of North London. This voung couple have located in the town of Ammanford, near Swansea. Brother Wood is a colporteur evangelist and already God is blessing his endeavours. He finds the territory in Wales much more fertile than London where he has been working. Brother Wood writes: "I am really being blessed in my colporteur work. I have started to work my territory so that I shall have covered the Amman valley and all the houses around Ammanford twice before next August and September so that you will be able to start a campaign there as vou suggested." It is certainly a remarkable coincidence that years ago Sister Wood lived in Wales and their neighbour was Mr. Sly (not then acquainted with the truth) who happens to be our only other full time colporteur in the Principality, We are glad to report that the literature sales in Wales are at the moment over £500 ahead of last year at this time, and this in spite of the fact that we have lost one of our most experienced men, Brother C. L. W. Cooke, to the staff of regular mission workers.
